I know many of you have a lot of boat chores to try to get completed over the winter, just as I do. However, during the evenings I love to lose myself in a good book. I especially like the historicalfiction genre. Below are the titles and short descriptions of some of the books that I have enjoyed this year.

- *The Wide Wide Sea*, by Hampton Sides this book is another take on the Captain James Cook's adventures and discoveries. This book focuses on his final voyage. The book is very well researched but is delivered in readable and evocative prose. Sides attempts to place Captain Cook into a more nuanced context, somewhere in between flawless adventurer on the one hand, and deliverer of all evils on the other.
- *Fire Weather*, by John Vaillant this is a truestory about the detailed investigation into all that transpired during the record-breaking Fort

McMurry Fire, in northern Alberta, Canada. This was the most expensive natural disaster in Canadian history. This book is several stories rolled into several books in one: Canadian history, the science of fire, world climate science, the history of the politics of oil, gas and coal companies, and the unprecedented devastation that modern fires wreak.

- Deep as the Sky, Red as the Sea, by Rita Chang-Eppig – this is a different type of pirate tale set in the South China Sea. In this tale, there is a young, fierce lady pirate at the helm. She is every bit as ruthless, murderous, and courageous as any male pirate. This is a book of salt and grit, blood and sweat.
- Isaac's Storm, by Erik Larson - this is one of my favorite authors and this story does not disappoint. It is riveting, powerful, and incredibly suspenseful. This book is based on the monster hurricane that completely destroyed the town of Galveston, Texas on September 8, 1900. Over six thousand people died in what some call the greatest natural disaster in American history. Larson uses Isaac Clines' own telegrams, letters, and reports, and the testimony of survivors to chronicle one man's heroic struggle and fatal miscalculation of a storm of unimaginable magnitude. This is a story of what can happen when human arrogance meets the great uncontrollable force of nature.
- *The Wager*, by David Grann this in another of my favorite historical fiction authors. In 1740, a British vessel, the *Wager*, left England on a secret mission during the imperial war with Spain. The ship wrecked on a desolate island off the coast of Patagonia. The marooned men built a flimsy craft and sailed it for more than 100 days and 3,000 miles to arrive in Brazil as heroes. However, six months later, another craft landed with three castaways who told a very different story of what happened. With lots of twists and turns the reader is held spellbound in this page-turning story of shipwreck, survival, and savagery.

Sailing Santa Cruz to Vallejo Kelly Wilson, Fleet 4 Member

Unusual Suspect, Catalina 22

I belong to a Face Book Group – Sailing San Francisco Bay and a member posted a message looking for a crew to help him sail his 27 ft. 1971 Coronado from Santa Cruz to Vallejo. I volunteered and invited another sailing friend to join. I wanted to share the wonderful adventure that the three of us had sailing 103 nautical miles from Santa Cruz to Vallejo.

At an average speed of 6 knots, it took us 3 days to complete the trip, so we broke the trip down into three legs:

- (1) Left Santa Cruz 10:00 am on 10/18/24, arriving at Half Moon Bay at 9:00 pm (41.7 nautical miles)
- (2) Left Half Moon Bay at 8:00 am 10/19/24, arriving at Emeryville at 5:00 pm (36.5 nautical miles)
- (3) Left Emeryville at 8:00 am 10/20/24, arriving at Vallejo at 11:30 am (25 nautical miles)

Thanks for the feedback on the RANT about the Americas Cup 37 in the last Fleet Fourum. Turns out that the Event played out pretty much as described in my issues, except they got rid of the "Drag Race Start". The KIWIS were racing the BRITS in the finals for a "First to Seven" win scenario. And the winner was - the KIWIS, 7-2. The BRITS managed two wins, one by good racing and one where the KIWIS fell off the foils before the start. They couldn't get it out of "First Gear".

Observations: The Semi's for the challenger between the BRITS and the Italians were more interesting. Another observation is that the KIWIS seem to be better at finding the pressure, as the boats were closely matched. When in the lead they rarely covered.

Fall has arrived; some maintenance time is nigh. Wrap your halyards around the mast if it is still raised, drain your carburetor bowl and run the motor till it stops, and cover the boat well, eliminating as many gaps as possible to keep the critters out. Putting the trailer on blocks can help too. Good to see everyone at the Banquet - Had a good time - The raffle was fun as always. Enjoy the Holidays everyone!
